

## Keynote Speakers

Robert J. Potts is President and CEO of the Dixon Water Foundation, a private foundation supporting healthy watersheds through good land management - with a particular emphasis on grazing and range management issues. From 2004 to 2007, Potts was the General Manager of the Edwards Aguifer Authority. From 1993 to 2004, Potts worked at The Nature Conservancy where he held several positions including State Director of Texas and Vice President for the South Central Division, managing the conservation work in Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. Potts previously practiced law with the firm of Baker & Botts in Houston where he focused on international and corporate issues. He earned a Juris Doctor degree from Columbia University in 1984 and a Bachelor of Arts degree from Baylor University in 1980. Potts grew up in Corsicana, Texas and has B.A. and M.A. degrees in Interdisciplinary Studies.

Spanning 40 years, **Steven Apfelbaum**, a senior ecologist with Applied Ecological Services, Inc (WI) and Ecological Society of America has conducted ecological research, designed award-winning projects, successfully navigated regulatory programs, and contributed his scientific expertise and unique creative approach to over 12,000 projects throughout U.S. and the world. He is focused on providing insight and design solutions at the intersection of ecological systems and working and developed land uses. Apfelbaum's books have won accolades including one of the ten best national environmental books in 2009 (Nature's Second Chance (Beacon press), and first "how-to" ecological restoration books "(Restoring Ecological Health to Your Land", and "Restoring Ecological Health to Your Land Workbook" (Island press). Apfelbaum is a frequent speaker and educator on ecological restoration, ecosystem assessment, alternative storm water management and conservation development, coastal systems and climate change, soil carbon sequestration, and issues related to land development worldwide. Steve resides in southern Wisconsin, on Stone Prairie Farm.

**Tyler Lark** is a researcher at the University of Wisconsin's Center for Sustainability and the Global Environment, working on issues at the intersection of land use, bioenergy, and food production. His research is focused on mapping and quantifying agricultural land-use change and its impacts across the United States to identify opportunities to reconcile production and conservation.

Jerry Doan operates Black Leg Ranch, which has been homesteaded since 1882, with his wife Renae and their three sons, the 5th generation. They are dedicated to improving soil health and regenerating the natural resources. Enterprises include cow calf, custom grazing, farming, a hunting/outfitting operation, and an Agri-Tourism operation. The ranch has hosted folks from 50 states and 35 foreign countries. Black Leg Ranch won the Leopold Conservation Award and the National Environmental Stewardship Award this year.

Deborah Clark and her husband, Emry Birdwell, live and ranch outside of Henrietta, Texas on what was the heart of the historic Bryant Edwards Ranch. They moved to the ranch in 2004, choosing to focus on an all stocker operation. Emry believed that using stockers was the most efficient and expedient way to restore the tall native grassland prairie. The ranch operates as one cell, under planned grazing with a single herd of 5,000 or more steers. The improvement, in the grasslands has been dramatic resulting in increased quantity, quality, and diversity of forage, and decreased bare ground. The ranch recently was awarded the Outstanding Rangeland Stewardship Award by the TSSRM and TSCRA. Deborah received the Terry Hershey Texas Women in Conservation award from Audubon Texas in 2016. She has served on many boards including Texas Wildlife Association, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers, and Texas Parks and Wildlife Upland Game Bird Advisory Council. She completed the Holistic Management Certified Educator program in June 2017.
