## **National Wildlife Federation**

### **Financial Overview**

The organization's statement of activities reports the results of the operations of the National Wildlife Federation (NWF).

#### **Funding**

In fiscal year 2018, NWF revenue totaled \$87.7 million, with ninety-four (94) percent of this revenue coming from supporters through contributions, memberships, publications, and mission related products.

Of the \$87.7 million revenue, \$34.7 million in donations and bequests came from generous individual donors, including our members, Guardians of the Wild, Leaders Club, President's Leadership Council, J.N. "Ding" Darling Circle, and members of our bequest legacy program, the Legacy Society.

National Wildlife Federation's conservation and education programs received 151 new foundation and corporate grants totaling \$21.5 million and 9 new government grants totaling \$.5 million. Major foundation grants were awarded by the David and Lucile Packard Foundation, Hewlett Foundation, William Penn Foundation, JPB Foundation, Walton Family Foundation, Moore Foundation, General Motors and other anonymous donors.

Revenues generated by NWF's publications totaled \$12.4 million. Nature Education Materials' revenue totaled \$9.1 million. Gain on investment income, royalties and other income yielded net revenue of \$4.8 million.

#### **Conservation Education Programs and Core Mission Support**

Conservation education programs expenses totaled \$75.9 million. General, administrative (6%) and fundraising expenses (9%), which support NWF's conservation mission, were only 15% of total expenses for 2018.

Total expense is slightly higher than total operating revenue due to leadership intentionally investing in programmatic work, mission delivery, innovation, technology and systems, staff capacity, and the acquisition of Zoobooks by utilizing operating surpluses and reserves from prior years.
